What would you like to do next? Are there any techniques or ideas you would like to explore? Or indeed would like to share with the group? If so, do let me know.



#### Stitch One Stitch - Canvas Stitches

Stitch One Stitch - Canvas Work - Scallop Stitch

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Continuing looking at composite stitches this month we are looking at Scallop stitch. I started it at our last meeting so several of you will already have seen my example. (Photo 1).

It is only used on single canvas and be warned - it is thread hungry! It is worked across 8 vertical canvas threads and 12 vertical canvas threads, so it is quite a big stitch producing a bold pattern of interlocking scallop shell shapes, useful for filling large areas. All the stitches are worked into the same hole at the bottom of the shell shape - so that hole gets rather crowded!

Looking at the stitch diagram, make a long vertical stitch down over 12 horizontal canvas threads (Movement 1-2). On either side of this central stitch make for other stitches fanning out so that the top of each stitch is one thread over and one below (one diagonally) to the left or right from the previous stitch (it is easier to work one side first and then the other). Then make four more stitches on each side with the tops of the stitches in line vertically with the last fanned stitch. You will have made 17 stitches in all.

#### ALL THESE STITCHES GO INTO THE SAME HOLE!

Continue across your row interlocking your stitches.

Now the tricky part (where I went wrong!) I made my first row at the top of the shape I was filling and then worked interlocking rows below the first row. The stitches interlock by making the starting point (top of first vertical long stitch) into the last stitch on the shell above (number 17 on the diagram) and then fan down as usual with the fourth fanning stitch going into the already cluttered bottom stitch of the row above. It was very difficult to locate the holes to stitch into under the mass of thread above. It would be much easier to start your first row at the BOTTOM of your shape to be filled so when you work subsequent rows above it you have a clear view of the diagonal holes at the top.




Photo of Scallop Stitch
